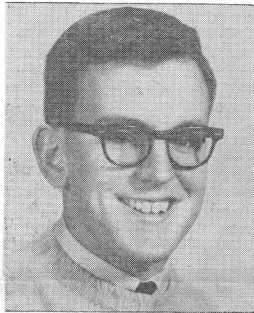

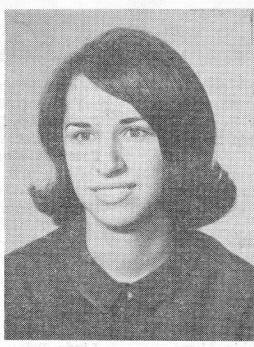

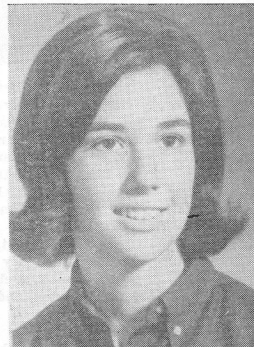

Batman Is Here— Are You Ready?

The Bat signal sweeps across the midnight sky and into the halls of CCHS. Batman is here, ready to take the place of rat finks, folk rock, and 007. He is one of the most enjoyable heroes since Bullwinkle for he is both fantastic and up-to-date.

Batman is Bruce Wayne, a wealthy socialite who decides to fight crime on his own. He disguises as a bat because criminals are cowardly and superstitious, and he must be a symbol of fear.

His headquarters, the Bat Cave, is located under his mansion. When the Gotham City police commis-

sioner needs help, he calls Batman on the Bat Phone. Batman and Robin, the Boy Wonder, jump into the double-door, four-on-the-floor, nuclear-powered Batmobile, and are off on another battle against crime.

The show is full of inconsistencies. Nobody knows who Batman really is, but they know where to reach him. The question is: Who installed the Bat Phone? IF THE Gotham City Telephone Company had, they would know where the Bat Cave was, the Batmobile had to be custom built. A company might be reluctant to make such a vehicle without knowing who bought it. Batman cannot claim an exemption for his income tax on his crime-fighting activities, because he does not even let the government know who he is.

Despite these inconsistencies, Batman is quite enjoyable. The characters are melodramatic, and so absurd they are funny. In a recent episode, Batman did not immediately chose the villain. The curtains of the hotel were on fire, and Batman remained to put out the fire, because his duty to the hotel was stronger. Robin gives appropriate exclamations ("Holy transistors!") and makes brilliant observations ("The opposite of a girl is a boy!").

The villains are entirely bad, and they stoop to the most dastardly ways of committing crimes. None of them are normal people. They do not avoid Batman, but come to Gotham City as a challenge.

Batman lives in a melodramatic, comic-book world where nothing is impossible. However, many people do not like Batman because he is such a heroic figure but is so clumsy. To others, this is his charm. Batman is so silly that he is hilarious. In spite of the show's stupidity, Batman is a welcome change from some of the bloodier shows on television today.

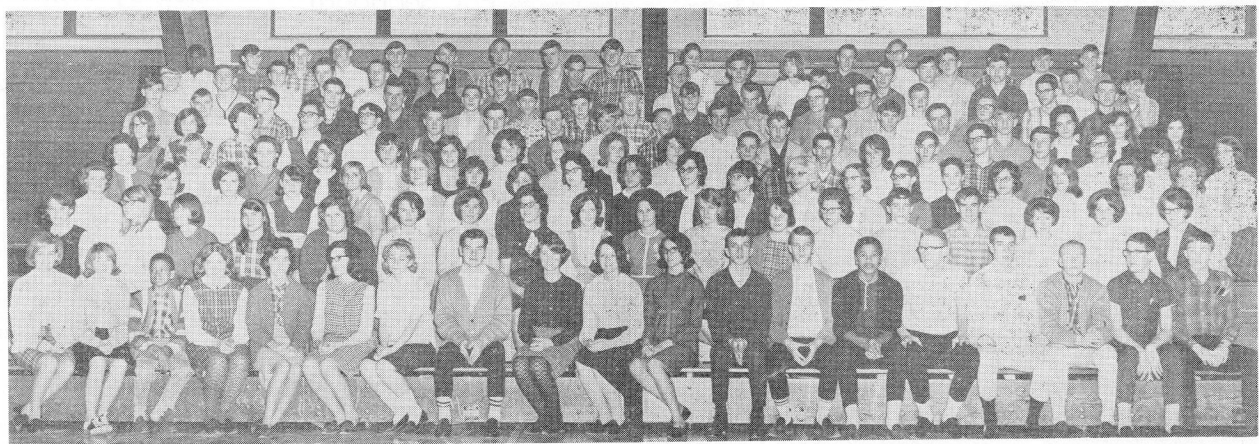
The students of CCHS would like to extend their sincere congratulations to the North Central Tigers and the student body upon their victory in the championship game of the Salem Sectional.

The 1966 Track Team will be bolstered by nine returning varsity lettermen and eight returning freshmen lettermen.

Eleven meets are on the schedule for this season, including the Brownstown Relays, Conference Relays, and the Conference Track Meet. The Freshman conference meet is scheduled later in the season and at least three more freshmen meets are in the making.

A breakdown of each event will give you a better picture of what should be expected of the boys.

### 100 - 220 Yard Dashes

He qualified for the sectional last year in the 220 and the 880 relay. ### Pole Vault

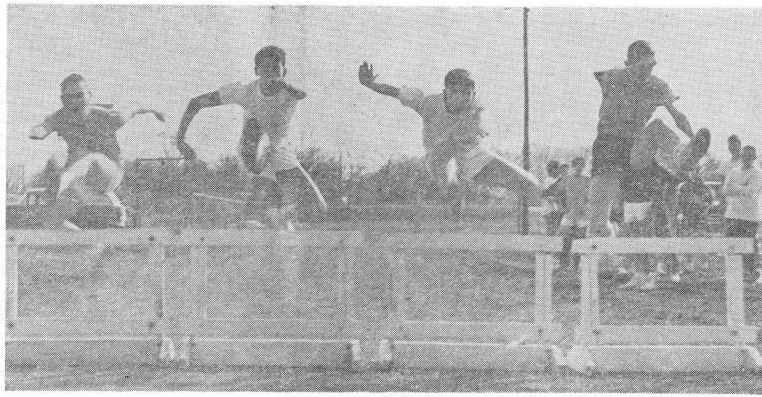

In the championship game of the Salem Sectional the North Central Tigers nipped the Corydon Panthers 59-52.

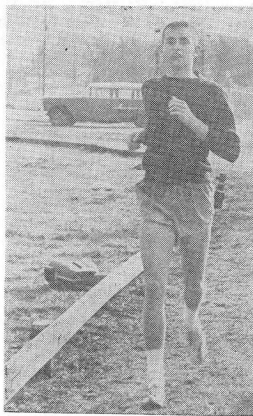
