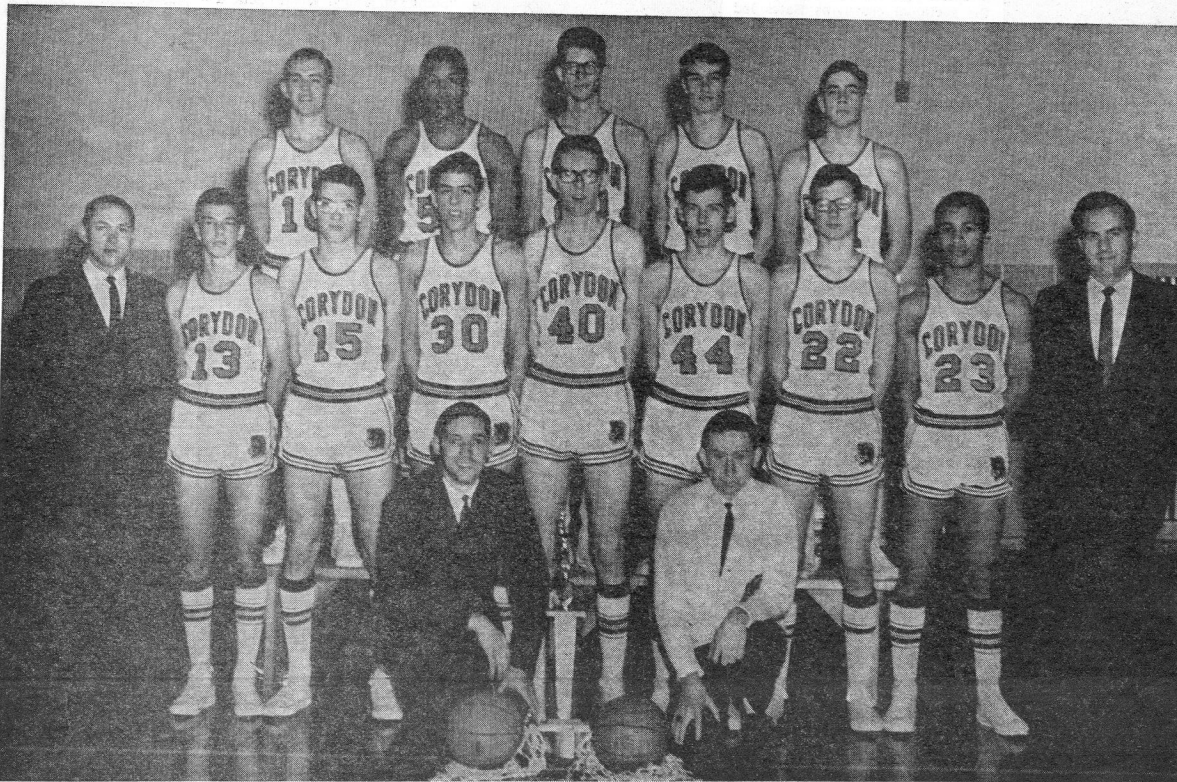

### Senators Crushed

### Corydon Takes Sectional Crown

The Corydon Central Panthers nailed down their fourth Salem Sectional Crown after routing the West Washington Senators 53-37.

The Panthers in what could easily be called their best game of the season committed only 7 fouls and shot 47.7 percent from the field and 60 percent from the gratis line.

West Washington took the lead at the opening tip on a jump shot by Carl Packwood which proved to be the first and last time they held the lead.

Corydon's only senior, Ireland Scott, hit two of his patented turn around jump shots and Coach John Wood's team was on its way. Both teams were red hot in the first quarter with Corydon sinking 60 percent and West Washington 50 percent.

At the end of the first stanza the score was 13-6 in Corydon's favor. In the second quarter each team matched each other shot for shot as the Panthers hit on 5 of 11 from the field and the Senators 5 of 12.

At the half Corydon still maintained the lead 26-17. With Bill Kirkham leading the way the Panthers kept up their dead-eye scoring attack in the third quarter. West Washington couldn't buy a basket in the second half as shot after shot just hit the rim and bounced off. The great rebounding of Scott, Bates, and Kirkham wasn't allowing them any second shots.

As the third quarter ended the Senators could score only four points and those came from field

goals by Brown and Packwood.

While West Washington was missing their shots and the Panthers were taking complete advantage they rolled up a lead of 17 points 38-21. The final quarter wasn't much different for the Senators as the one before, as the Panthers continued to find the range from the field. By now it was not a question of who would win the Sectional Crown but by how much the Corydon team would win. By the final buzzer the Panthers had rolled up a 53-37 score, and the Salem Gym was a

complete madhouse.

Scoring honors went to Bill Kirkham with 21 points who with Monty Schneider out front contained West Washington's Ron Chastain who went scoreless. Up to this time Chastain had averaged 22 points a game. During parts of the third and fourth quarters, Bill had more points than the whole West Washington team. Ireland Scott contributed 13 points and was all over the court either shooting, passing, or grabbing rebounds. Even though they didn't score many points, the great floor play

of Alan Hess and Doug Bates can not be overlooked as they were pulling down rebounds and setting up plays.

Two West Washington players were in double figures, Steve Brown with 12 and Carl Packwood scored 13.

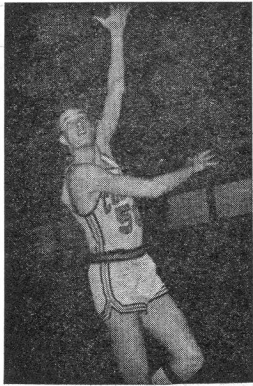
Incidentally the day before the Sectional was Coach John Wood's birthday. Almost speechless after the game he said, "You couldn't ask for a better present."

we're going for."

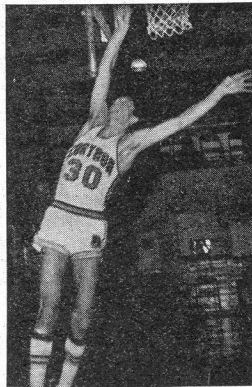

# Let's Go Panthers To The Top



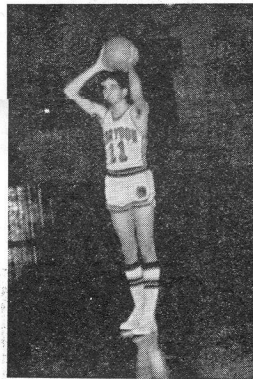

Being a multi-talented athlete, Doug participates in football, baseball, and track as well as basketball.



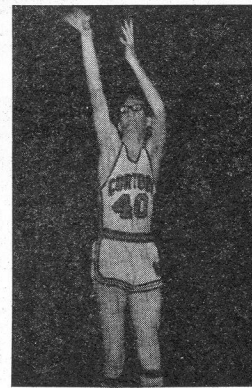

Alan also is active in other sports having participated in golf, cross country, baseball, track and football. In addition, he is a member of the National Honor Society and president of the "C" Club.



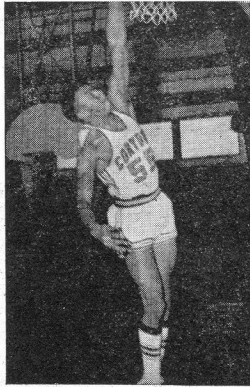

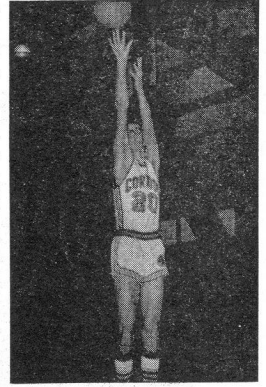
Contrary to some reports, Bennett's shooting has won several milk shakes for him this winter, although he's having a tough time collecting them.

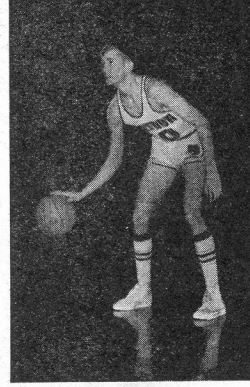

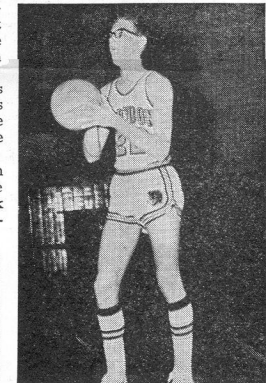
Bill also participates in golf, having been a vital cog in Corydon's golf sectional championships of the past two years. Bill is a member of the National Honor Society.

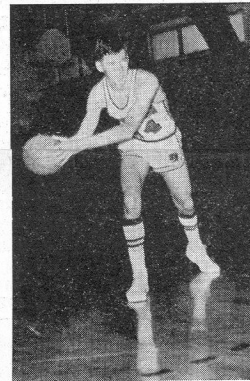
This shooting touch of Jack's is also evident on the golf course as he has led the golf team to the State Finals for two consecutive years.

Although his scores are low on the golf course, they are just the opposite in the class room as Jack is a member of the National Honor Society.



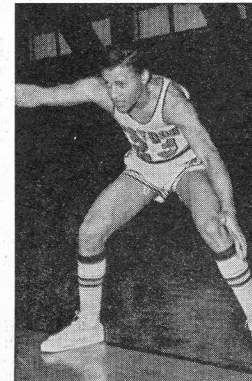
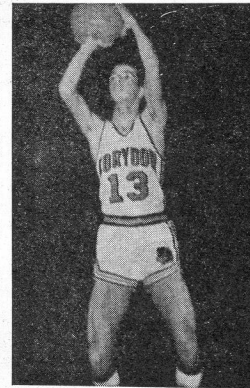

Mike's interests are wide and varied as he is a member of Future Teachers of America, an avid horseman, and shows promise as an artist.



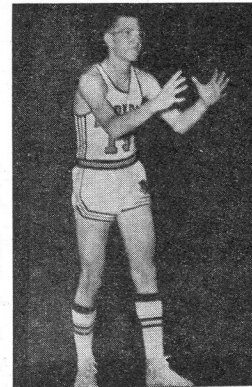

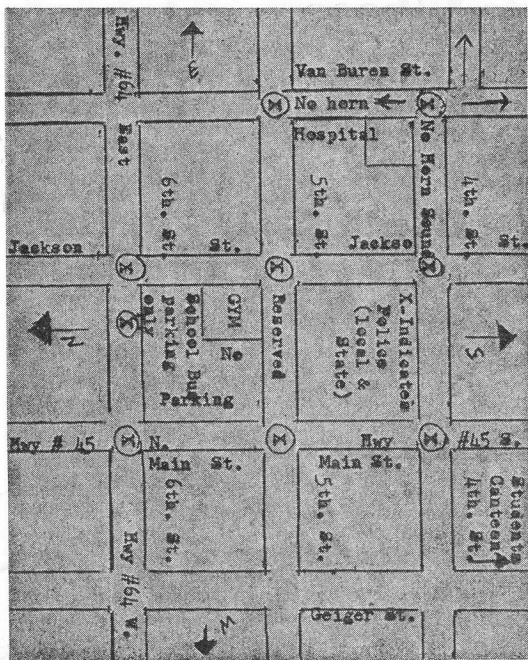
The 1961 team needed an overtime for their one-point win over Pekin — center Spencer Noe provided the winning margin in that game. Then the Panthers beat Campbellsburg (now West Washington) by 5 points to set up the championship battle with host Salem. The Lions fell 78-68 in what proved to be the easiest game of the sectional for Coach Cato's boys.

Again this year, the final game proved to be the easiest of the tourney. After besting Marengo, the Panthers rolled over West Washington by 16 points.

But the teams and scores aren't the only similarities between the two years. After winning the 1961 Salem Sectional championship, the team and fans spent the night in Salem because of the snowfall. This year we almost didn't make it to the Sectional because of the snow. Thus, a lot of "old-timers" refer to snowy, blowing weather as "Corydon Panther weather."

Although the coaches and players have changed, many of the "old-timers" are still around to cheer for the present-day Panthers and most of today's team followed the '61 Panthers to Evansville. All the fans hope this year's team put the following in the '61 Panthers footsteps — all the way to Evansville.

## Regional Officials Set Regulations

All games of the Huntingburg 1967 Regional will be played on Central Standard Time. First game —12:30 p.m. CST and the final game 8:15 p.m. CST.

Mr. Saulman and Coach Wood attended a meeting on Monday morning of coaches and athletic directors of the four schools participating in the Regional.

The group met with Huntingburg school officials and local Police officials. The mayor, Dale W. Helmerich, welcomed the group and assured the visiting officials that the city would do everything possible for the pleasure and convenience of the visitors.

Nine full time and extra police will be on duty to handle the traffic problems before the game. The Indiana State Police will assist in crowd control and traffic.

The mayor requested the following items noted carefully:

- (A) No left turn on 6th and Main Streets, also limited left turns within the area around the gym.
- (B) No horns sounding within one block of the hospital.
- (C) No blocking of alleys, private drives or business lots.
- (D) No excessive speeding.
- (E) Pedestrians should cross at crosswalks — No jaywalking.

Other rules that were outlined should be noted:

- 1. No lost or forgotten tickets will be replaced.
- 2. No pass-outs for students will be given.
- 3. No confetti, bean shooters, water guns, megaphones or shakers (except for cheerleaders) and no mascots will be allowed.
- 4. No trophy will be given — winner takes ball and nets.
