

## Golfers Capture First Sectional Prepare For State Meet

Having the golf sectional moved from Bedford to Huntingburg and Jasper was a blessing for the Panther linksmen. After playing the two nine-hole courses, the golf team captured the first sectional crown ever won by Corydon Central. Jack Miles paced the locals to victory with a two under par 65 which was low for all competition in the sectional to win him medalist honors. Jim Mathews, Bill Kirkham and John Kirkham completed the four man total with 73, 74, and 80 respectively. Corydon's 292 total was threatened only by Evansville North's 295.

After losing an eighteen hole match to New Albany by four strokes, and squeezing past Silver Creek by three the same week as the sectional, the Panthers played

## Miss Mary Eskew Saluted By Students And Faculty Resigns After Long, Outstanding Service

The last issue of the 1964-1965 Pantherette honors Miss Mary Eskew, who is retiring from teaching after forty - one years of experience. Miss Eskew has spent thirty - one of those years in the Corydon Central School System and eight years in Jackson Township, one year at Georgetown, and one year in Washington Township.

When she was first hired at Corydon in 1934, her schedule of classes included English and physical education. Now, in 1965, her class subjects include algebra, three sections, and business arithmetic, two sections.

### J. C. Rice Superintendent Elkhart City Schools

Mr. J. C. Rice, superintendent when Miss Eskew was hired, said the following about her in a letter to the Pantherette staff:

"It seems just a little while since we invited Mary Eskew to join the staff of Corydon High School.

In 1934 there seemed to be a dozen applicants for every teaching position. The pay was low and most schools were unable to meet their payrolls. But there were still good teachers who were willing to teach either with or without the monthly pay check.

Corydon High School needed an English teacher and also a young

were fortunate enough to select a young, charming and gracious girl from New Salisbury. From that time Mary Eskew has been an important part of the school which has done so much for its young people.

It was our pleasure to work with Miss Eskew for a few years and to have reports of her work since. We can think of no greater compliment than to say that she has been a really good teacher. We hope that the years ahead will yield the continued interests and satisfactions she has so well learned."

### Supt. Schneider Speaks

Twenty - one years and seven superintendents later, Mr. Edmund Schneider, present superintendent of Corydon Central, said in closing his speech to the local Classroom Teachers Association:

Those of us closely connected with education, as well as those in the community, appreciate the forty - one years that Miss Eskew has devoted so conscientiously to the teaching profession. May her retirement years allow her to do many of the things that will make those years enjoyable.

### Principal Saulman, Former Pupil, Speaks

It has been my pleasure to have attended classes with Miss Mary Eskew as the teacher. It has been doubly so to return 20 years later as the Principal of the school in which Miss Eskew is still teaching. Her contribution to my education and hundreds of others will always be her most outstanding monument.

My wish for her future is continued good health and the ability to enjoy those things she missed through 41 years of devoted service to her school and community.

### Student's Observation

I would like to thank Miss Eskew for that year in algebra, at times painful for me but greatly appreciated afterwards. Every time I walked into the algebra room, I felt the dignity that could be had in learning and the determination of the teacher that I learn. Never have I had a class in which I have so thoroughly learned a subject. Thank you, Miss Eskew, for being the kind of teacher that you were to me.

### Miss Eskew's Observations

As I finish my years of teaching, I can recall many characteristics that I have observed in my students. Three of these characteristics I consider vital to any student. If these are not natural, they may be acquired.

Courtesy is a basic quality and should be observed under all conditions without regard to discourtesy among others - as in assemblies, for instance.

Industry needs much attention. Fortunate, indeed, is the pupil who is naturally industrious, but if he is not so inclined he can work on himself and improve. Work is helpful in so many ways that they can not all be numbered. In general, work helps greatly to bring the student a healthy physical, mental, and spiritual life for all people.

Loyalty is a third desirable quality. There is need for loyalty to family, to school, to country, and to God. Many other qualities are developed in connection with this quality.

Cultivation of courtesy, industry, and loyalty will bring rich rewards.

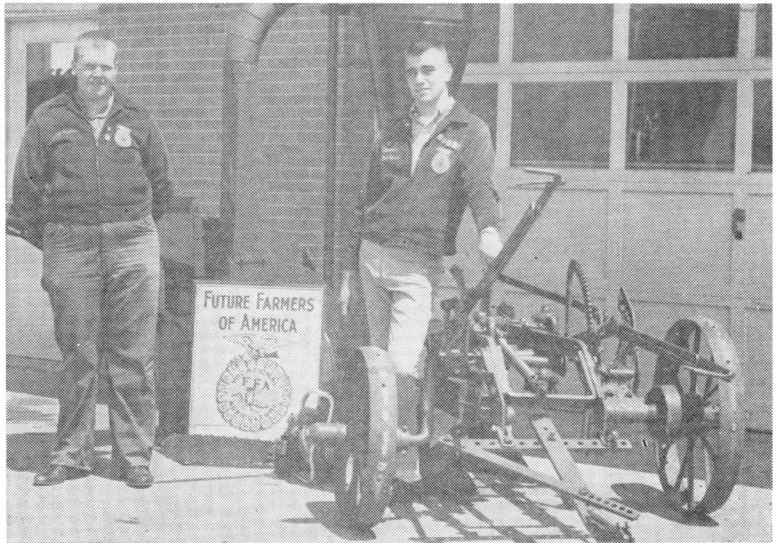

## FFA Names Two Seniors For Farm Machinery Demonstrations In Mexico

Carl Mathes, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Mathes, Sr., and Danny Sutherland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Sutherland, both seniors at Corydon Central High School, have been chosen to be among twenty Future Farmers of America boys

who are to travel to Mexico this summer. They will go to Mexico in June.

**MORE THAN TWO THOUSAND** of the approximately ten thousand boys who are members of the Future Farmers of America in In-

diana applied for the privilege of participating in the experiment.

The twenty boys chosen were selected for their leadership, knowledge of mechanics, and their personality and their scholastic standing.

**PURPOSE** of the trip is to give the boys who go a chance to teach the farmers of Mexico how to use, repair and care for various types of farm machinery. The Corydon Central chapter of FFA in which Danny and Carl are members, donated three pieces of farm machinery which will be sent to Mexico with them and which will be given to the Mexican people.

A chain saw was donated by Kenneth H. Brown and Son Inc., of Corydon, a feed grinder by Davis Y. Monroe's John Deere Dealership of Corydon, and a plow by Jacobi Sales, of Palmyra.

Danny and Carl will take the machinery to Indianapolis June 1, and from there it will be shipped to Mexico. On June 2 they will be briefed about the project, and on June 3 they will leave by bus from Indianapolis. They will be in Mexico thirty days.

The State FFA will provide one hundred dollars toward the boys' expenses, but the boys will have to provide their own money for incidentals.

## J. Elam Speaks To Business Classes

Mr. James Elam, who is employed by the International Business Machines Corporation as a systems engineer, spoke to the commercial classes on electronic computers.

He explained in detail some of the complicated steps taken to compute information. First, instructions are fed into the automated equipment. This can be in the form of a punched card, magnetic tape, or a magnetic disc. The instructions are then processed or compiled. The output is the completed task in the form of information compiled by the machine.

He explained that a programmer sets up the machine to perform a given task. By this means, we can actually speak to the computer by inserting the instructions and the data that the machine will need to carry out the task.

This automated method of computing information saves much time and is easier. Mr. Elam said that a person had to be specially trained to operate these complicated machines.

Because of the functions these

very expensive to purchase; therefore, most large companies prefer to rent them. Rent on different machines start as low as \$695 and go all the way up to \$100,000 a month.

Mr. Elam is the son of Mrs. Margaret Elam. He is a graduate of Purdue University and has a B.S. degree in engineering and a Masters degree in Business Administration. Before entering Purdue Mr. Elam had graduated from the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn., and had served overseas in the Korean War.
