Sophomore Wins Science Award



LYNN ANDERSON, a sophomore, will participate in a Chemistry and Physics Research Institute at the University of Tennessee, at Knoxville, for six weeks this summer.

Lynn was one applicant out of thirty chosen by the University where approximately five hundred students applied. A battery of tests were given to those applying for admission and the recipients chosen from the test results.

In addition to being accepted at Tennessee, Lynn had also applied at the University of Virginia and Indiana University and was accepted at all three universities. He chose Tennessee because the date for this institute did not interfere with his other summer plans.

There are approximately two hundred such institutes held in the U.S.A. each summer and during 1966 seventy-five hundred high school students participated in the institutes which are sponsored by the National Science Foundation, Washington, D. C.

K. McCoy - Klines Receive FTA Awards

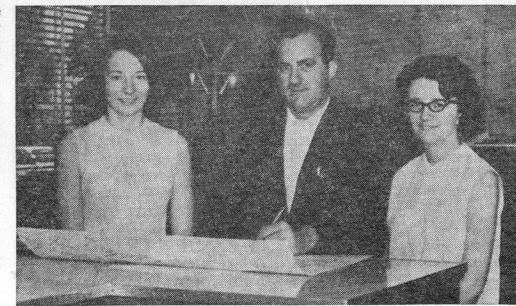
Karen McCoy, Kris Kline and Kathy Kline will be the recipients of the cash awards from the Future Teachers Club.

The small number in the class was easily understood since this was the first class to reach high school that had been required to reach the age of six years before Labor Day in order to be enrolled in the first grade.

Exempt from wearing the beanie because he was an alumnus of CCHS, Class of 43, but entering CCHS as the new principal was Mr. Earl Saulman. Other new faces among the faculty members were Mr. Joe Elliott, head football coach and World History teacher; and Mr. Lawrence Fluhr, general math and geometry.

Barbara Overton was elected president of the class; Mark Wiseman, vice-president and Kris Kline secretary-treasurer.

Two members of the class were elected Cub cheerleaders — Judy Cato and Kris Kline.

133 Soph. Return To CCHS

Having lost three students from our number, we entered school in September '64 with an enrollment of 133 students. Again we were the smallest of the four classes.
